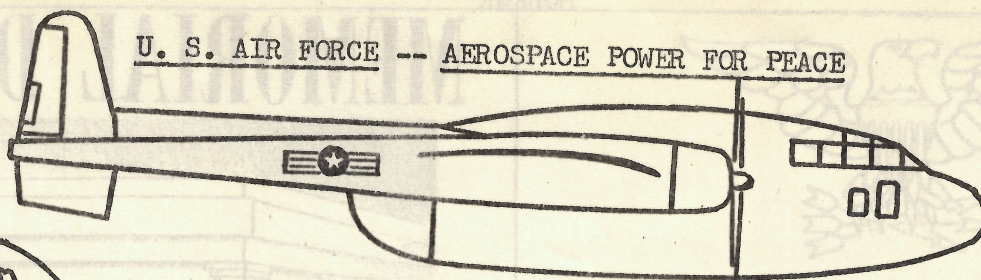

Pictures of the men along with the complete account of the incident, submitted by Maj J.C. Kennedy, appeared on the back cover of the Apr-May issue of "CRASH". In addition these men have been nominated for the "WELL DONE" award by Flying Safety Magazine.

Capt. Florence was aircraft commander, Major Oades, co-pilot and S/Sgt Kersey the flight engineer during the flight when the incident occurred.

In "CRASH" the comment was: "Well done for handling a critical emergency in a competent and professional manner".

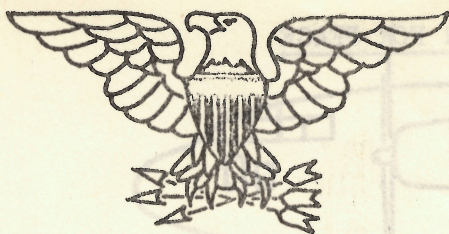

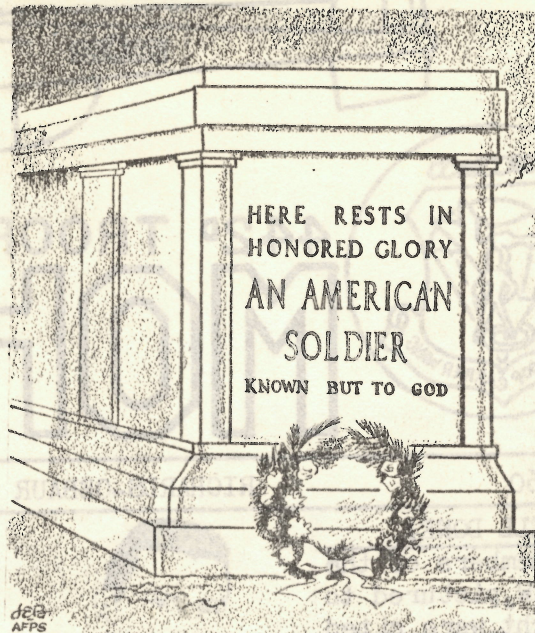

NEW OFFICER UNIFORM BY 1962

Air Force officers will be required to own the newly adopted summer weight blue uniform in 1962, but it will not be a mandatory item for the airmen until May, 1963.

Identical in color, cut and style to the familiar winter service uniform, the new outfit may be distributed to new recruits at Lackland AFB, Texas, in 1962, the Air Force said.

The new uniform was given the green light last fall after exhaustive tests. (AFPS)

INTELLIGENCE BRIEFS

ALL-AMERICANSHELL'S ANGELS - The 11th Airborne Division

(The second of a series on
Army Airborne Divisions)

The 11th Airborne Division, the only U.S. airborne division to see action in the Pacific Theater in World War II, was formed at Camp Mackall, North Carolina in 1943. Its early organization, one parachute infantry regiment and two glider infantry regiments, which remained its principal elements until V-J Day, reflected the thinking of the Army's Airborne command that time was too short to produce large numbers of paratroopers and transport planes. The reliance on the glider units mirrored also the early German successes with the use of gliders in airborne operations.

The 11th sailed for overseas duty in the early spring of 1944, training for jungle and amphibious warfare in New Guinea. Their first combat duty made little use of their specialized training, as they helped push the Japanese from the island of Leyte in the Philippines. In its next assignment, the invasion of Luzon, glider units of the 11th splashed ashore from landing craft to join forces with the parachute infantry, who jumped in three waves from transport aircraft. For its ground, amphibious, and paratroop attack on the infamous Japanese prison camp at Los Banos, the 1st Battalion, 511th Par Inf, received a Distinguished Unit Citation. In the last combat drop of World War II, 1,100 men descended by parachute and glider in southern Luzon. Flying into Tokyo the Division, slated for occupation duty, greeted the 1st Cavalry Division as it arrived by sea. In 204 days of combat in World War II, it suffered 2400 casualties.

The Division returned to the U. S. in 1950. Although its 187th A/B Infantry took part in the Korean War, the Division itself remained at Ft. Campbell, Ky., until 1956, when it was sent to Germany for occupation duties. In June, 1959, the unit was deactivated; two of its battle groups were transferred to the 24th Infantry Division, a new composite infantry--airborne division in Germany.

DOUGLAS DILLON ON
THE BERLIN QUESTION

Under Secretary of State Douglas Dillon, in a speech early this month, voiced the Free World's opinion on the Berlin situation. He declared that if we permit the courageous people of West Berlin to be sold into communistic slavery no nation could preserve its faith in collective security.

Mr. Dillon made it clear that, while the Western nations are willing to consider interim arrangements to reduce tensions in Berlin and lessen present dangers, "we are determined to maintain our presence in Berlin and to preserve its ties with the Federal Republic". The Under Secretary warned that ~~the~~ West will not accept any agreement which might become "a first step toward the abandonment of West Berlin or the extinguishing of freedom in that part of Germany which is a free, peaceful, and democratic member of the world community".

"Mr. Khrushchev continues to insist that Western forces leave West Berlin and that it be declared a 'free city'. He ignores the fact that West Berlin is already a free city--a lone island of freedom within the boundaries of the sprawling Communist empire. When he speaks of making West Berlin a 'free city', his meaning is only too clear; he desires West Berlin to be free from protection, free from security, free from its commercial and cultural ties with West Germany--and cut off from freedom itself".

A BIT OF AIR HISTORY

May 19, 1908--Lt. Thomas E. Selfridge, U. S. Army, first soldier to flay a heavier than air machine, piloted the airplane "White Wing" (second of Dr. Alexander Graham Bell's Aerial Experiment Association planes) at Hammondsport, N. Y. This airplane was equipped with hinged ailerons.

May 25, 1910--Orville and Wilbur Wright flew together for the first time--Dayton, Ohio.

May 19, 1919--M/Sgt. Ralph W. Botttrill made the first jump by Army personnel with a free backpack type parachute. This event was the first action in point of time for which the Distinguished Flying Cross was awarded.

ANNOUNCE MORE AF RES REORGANIZATION PLANS

A new Air Reserve Forces program will replace ConAC's three numbered Air Forces with six Air Force Reserve Regions, DOD announced in mid May.

This, along with other earlier changes, is aimed at increasing the efficiency and usefulness of the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve.

Air Force Reserve Regional headquarters will be established by Sept., 1960 at Mitchell AFB, N. Y.; Andrews AFB, Md.; Warner-Robins AFB, Ga.; Kelly AFB, Texas; Selfridge AFB, Mich. and Hamilton AFB, Calif.

The three numbered Air Forces being inactivated are 14th (Warner-Robins) 10th (Selfridge) and Fourth (Hamilton).

Geographic responsibilities of the reserve regions under the new plan will correspond to those of existing Army areas.

A major change of the reserve organization is the change of responsibility for training and inspection. Major air commands of the AF will assume the peacetime supervision of training and inspection of Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve units over which they have operational control in wartime. This formerly was ConAC's responsibility.

ConAC will continue to command AF reserve units through its reserve regions and provide administrative, personnel, logistic and budgetary support.

Under the reorganization plan, the number of people assigned to support the reserve program will be reduced from 19,500 to approximately 16,000.

The region structure will give reservists a much larger voice in management of the Air Force Reserve program. Each region, to be commanded by an Air Force general officer with an inactive reserve general officer as deputy, will be staffed by 32 active duty personnel and 85 inactive duty reservists.

Existing Air Force facilities will be utilized for region headquarters. ConAC headquarters will remain at Mitchell AFB, New York. (AFNS)

An early press deadline sometimes means that things that were supposed to happen get into print and then don't happen. Such was the case with the troop drop at Olathe Armed Forces Day---however men of the 442d TCW were on hand, the wind was too strong for the drop to be made---with safety.

RESPONSE FAIR FOR SMALL ARMS TRAINING

Tryouts for the 442d TCW Pistol Team were conducted during the May UTA at the Base range. A total of 37 indicated their interest by availing themselves of the facilities provided.

Four members of the group fired sharpshooter scores (210 or over out of 300); A/3C T. H. Browne, CAMRON, posted the high with 236; S/Sgt. Carl Keller, Hq. Sq., was second with 228; M/Sgt Ernest J. Galeassi, 303rd, scored 226; S/Sgt. D. F. McSpadden, Supply came in under the wire with 210.

Two qualified as Marksman with scores of 194 and 187 respectively. Both are of the Air Police Squadron.

The proposed training schedule for the June and July UTAs will include range and classroom instruction (Phase I, .45 cal. pistol) for special category personnel, (Air Police and Aircrew members) and continued tryouts for the 442d Pistol Team.

It is proposed to hold classroom and range instruction, during the summer tour, for personnel not on flying status with .30 cal. carbine. This will include the Air Police but will exclude WAF, Chaplain and Medical personnel.

Major E. N. Decker has been designated Range Officer; S/Sgt. C. G. Keller, NCOIC small arms training; S/Sgt. H. B. Wittman, Range NCO; A/3C T.H. Browne, range assistant; A/1C C. L. Smith, administrative clerk and A/2C R. L. Brewer, classroom instructor.

* The May 2 issue of U. S. News and World Report carried the following *
* item: 'Young pilots of the Air Force who believe that the airplane may *
* be on the way out in the developing missile age are reported to be *
* applying in large numbers for transfer to the Army. The Army now has *
* more than 5,000 planes and helicopters and plans to expand air support *
* for ground forces'.

* Legislation enacted in August 1958 authorized inter-service trans- *
* fers. As of April 20, 1960, 21 AF officers have applied for transfer *
* to other services. These 21 consisted of one second lieutenant, nine *
* first lieutenants, nine captains, one major and one lieutenant colonel. *
* Two of the applicants were medical officers, one Judge Advocate, and *
* three were on flying status. Eight of the 21 USAF applicants have been *
* accepted by the other services.

* During this same period of time, 150 officers from other services *
* have applied for transfer to the Air Force. To date, 30 have been *
* accepted.

JULY 25 CUTOFF DATE
FOR WW II GI LOANS

World War II veterans have until July 25 to obtain a Veteran's Administration guaranteed or insured home loan.

The veteran must complete his contract with the builder for purchase of a home by that date. Additionally, he must have applied to a lender for a loan and the lender must have processed his application together with supplemental documents through the VA before July 25.

The termination date for guarantee of insurance of loans to veterans of the Korean War is January 31, 1965.

PARTICIPATED IN MANY ARMED FORCES DAY ACTIVITIES.

In conjunction with other military units in the Greater Kansas City area, plus some 160 men from the 101st Airborne Division, Ft. Campbell, Ky., reservists of the 442d Troop Carrier Wing participated in a huge Armed Forces Day open house at the U.S. Naval Air Station at Olathe, Saturday May 21.

However the appearance of the 442d TCW at Olathe was not the only activity indulged by members of the Wing. Three aircraft made flyovers at Omaha, Topeka, Springfield and Ft. Leonard Wood, May 21; and on May 22 three aircraft made flyovers at Whiteman AFB and Boonville.

Approximately 160 paratroopers from the 101st Airborne Division were dropped from nine aircraft at Olathe, and three of the C-119's were placed on display. Each was equipped for different missions; passengers, troop drops and air evacuation.

C-119's were also placed on display at Whiteman AFB and Patterson Field.
