## **Interesting Facts**

October 18, 1962 – Eight Air Force Reserve troop carrier wings and six aerial port squadrons, totaling more than 14,200 Reservists and 400 aircraft, were mobilized for one month during the Cuban missile crisis.

**October - November 1973** – Air Force Reserve C-141 associate aircrews flew hundreds of missions into Israel and the Middle East during the Arab-Israeli War, confirming the Total Force Policy and the Air Force Reserve's ability to fit into active Air Force operations by volunteering.

**April 1, 1997**– The Air Force Reserve Command activated its first Air Education and Training Command associate training units, the 5th Flying Training Flight, Vance AFB, OK and the 43rd Flying Training Flight, Columbus AFB, MS.
